* What can you count as elective courses?
What counts: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Regularly scheduled 500-level JHR courses - Elective courses listed in the JHR Program Handbook for each track
What needs to be approved (in advance) by both your advisor & the graduate program director: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Individualized JHR courses (e.g., 580, 584, 590, 592) - 400-level courses in any discipline - Courses transferred in from other universities
What does not count: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 585 or 595 credits - 100, 200, or 300-level courses

General Guidelines
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - You may apply only 6 credits of 400-level work toward the master's degree - You must meet all GPA and grade requirements outlined in the New College Satisfactory Academic Progress Policy - You must be enrolled in at least one credit that appears on your iPOS or one credit of JHR 595 continuing registration each Fall/Spring semester. - All coursework must be approved by your advisor and formalized in the iPOS. Mere enrollment in a course does not entitle you to count it toward a graduate degree.
